Tree Tops is the most popular class at Eagle Bluff. And we're always making changes and improvements to align with industry standards and maintain the highest level of safety possible. 2015 found us changing carabineers on safety straps to snap hooks, which require the user to perform 2 steps to open them. We also rearranged and added new elements to our courses.

But the most popular improvement was the addition of a practice course on the ground. Students get to practice switching safety straps one at a time. And practice elements on the high course. All the changes will make the Tree Tops experience more enjoyable for all our users. Parent Note from:

My son Carson attended last week from Longfellow Elementary. I wanted to cry as he told me about his experience. He talked about how we are affecting the environment and how

we need to pay attention to the little changes that we make because these changes can grow and affect the whole food chain and the environment of the wild life.

He talked about everything that he had the opportunity to do. He said that he didn't want to do just one thing because he knew that when he got home, he would regret not trying all of the activities. He talked about the corn bread that he made and the raspberry tea that he drank. Carson loved the rope course and the team challenges; he said he learned a lot about team work.

As the days go on, Carson will share more and more with us. He even tried to teach his 25 year old sister how to use a compass. He talked about the meals and how great the food was, and how the milk was super cold! He told us about the food challenge that they needed to eat what they took.

Carson came home with so much knowledge and positive experiences that it made me tear up thinking about how empathetic he is for the environment, a skill that really can't be taught. I have a feeling that in the future his work will somehow be around conservation and environmental studies.

I am not sure who to thank or who will read this, but from Carson's parents, we thank everyone who helped and taught our son over those three valuable days. He told me that Eagle Bluff was different than what he thought it was going to be. I paused, and asked him how it was different. He replied, "It was so much better, than what I thought it was going to be." That statement was HUGE because from 1st grade until last Tuesday night, Carson talked about going to Eagle Bluff when he was in fifth grade. Please, please thank everyone who had the opportunity to teach last week, because I want them to know that their time, efforts, preparation and patience was not wasted on Carson. Thank you

You also gave a single day of unique learning to 2,545 students from 116 different groups. 



We were awarded \$18,695 from the **Fillmore County Soil & Water Conservation District** to help manage our storm water run-off problems and improve water quality.

The largest project was the hill by the Discovery Center. Gone is the washed out gravel path. In it's place is a beautiful terraced retaining wall and metal staircase.

Smaller improvements were made on ditches near the Discovery Center and the large parking lot. Each of these projects have native prairie plants to help with drainage and increase natural habitat areas for students to explore








A **Prairie Mural** now adorns the wall by the stairwell in the Discovery Center thanks to the talents of Brent Anderson, Fellowship Coordinator.

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Donor Spotlight: Anah and Howard Munson

Howard and Anah both grew up on farms. It is perhaps natural that they should develop a deep and enduring interest in nature. In Howard's case, it led to a career in the teaching of biology and ultimately teacher education. For Anah incorporating nature in teaching art, a passion for gardening and owning a



tree farm inspired her commitment to making future generations aware of their responsibility to safeguard it.

Long before the property was known as "Eagle Bluff", and before the Schroeder building was erected, the site was a center for environmental education. Howard recalls presenting workshops in Joe Deden's front room and basement to introduce area teachers to Project Learning Tree and Project Wild. These programs were distributed by the Minnesota Department of Education in the early 80's.

The transition to a place where school children could be housed and given the thrill of interacting with nature has increased the Munsons' interest and commitment to Eagle Bluff E.L.C. They are happy to support outdoor learning opportunities for children, especially those students who might not otherwise be introduced to the wonders of the natural world.

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Donor Spotlight: Beth and Dale Bargsten

Jerome Deden's parents were in my parent's wedding in June of 1943. His parent's dairy farm was located about four miles from ours. My mother, Verona, kept sending us newspaper articles on Jerome's career with the Forest Service and his research in growing mushrooms on oak logs. Upon my dad's death in 2007, my mother wanted to donate some money to Eagle Bluff. We went together on a tour of the learning center in 2008.

The 160 acre family farm I grew up on was organic and sustainable although neither we nor anyone we knew had

ever heard of those terms. To us, 'eating local' meant going out the back door for fresh eggs from our chickens, vegetables from our large garden or a trip to the milking parlor's bulk tank for a five quart bucket of fresh milk. We raised chickens, hogs, dairy cattle and beef cattle on the corn, soybeans, oats, alfalfa and pasture grown on the farm's land. What we didn't harvest, butcher or process ourselves, we sold for cash. When I left the farm for college in 1962, I was actually shocked at the poor taste of grocery store produce and meat as it was quite different from what I had grown up with.

My grandfather, who was a dairy farmer, often said, "You take care of the land and it will take care of you". He instilled in me a great respect for all living things and their interrelationships.

When we learned of the plan at Eagle Bluff to start a Food Lab Education Program, we realized it was something very dear and important to my wife and myself. Today, urban youth may not have the opportunity to know what good, fresh, wholesome food tastes like. Eagle Bluff offers students quality food and emphasizes taking only what you can eat. Hopefully students will acquire both a taste and respect for this food and where it comes from which they take home to share with their own families.

After a career in plant genetics and my experience of growing up on a farm, I have a deep appreciation of living things. Eagle Bluff offers many opportunities for people to be involved with the natural world. The enthusiasm of the staff in these programs teaches young people how important the natural world is and how to understand it. Eagle Bluff passes on values that will make our world a sustainable place through youth who will be better stewards of the land because of their experience here.

My wife and I are proud to support this work. Thank you Eagle Bluff. Dale and Beth Bargsten

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
